TO THE HONORABLE, THE JUDGES OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY
COURT OF CRIMINAL APPEALS

COMES NOW the undersigned appellate defense counsel, pursuant to
Rules 23 and 24 of this court's Rules of Appellate Procedure, and moves this
court to grant appellant's motion for a 30-day extension of time until **11
February 2023** to file a Brief on Behalf of Appellant.

1. Consistent with Army Reg. 27-26, Rules of Professional Conduct for
Lawyers, undersigned counsel request additional time to ensure that
all due diligence has been done to adequately review, investigate,
research, and brief the assignments of error in this case and to fulfill
counsel's ethical obligation to represent Appellant's interest.

2. The record of trial is 631 pages. This is a contested case, and an enlisted panel sitting as a general court martial found appellant guilty, contrary to his plea, of three specifications of abusive sexual contact, and one specification of wrongful impersonation of a military police investigator, in violation of Articles 120 and 106, UCMJ. (Charge Sheet). An enlisted panel sentenced appellant to be confined for sixteen months, reduced to the grade of E-1, and to be discharged from the service with a bad-conduct discharge. Appellant consents to the extension.
3. The due date is **12 January 2023**. [REDACTED] has not been able to finalize the draft of the Brief on Behalf of Appellant with either the detailed military appellate counsel or appellant, due to other obligations and cases. [REDACTED] currently has forty eight cases, including nineteen cases at the Army Court, three cases at the Air Force Court, three cases at the Navy and Marine Court, five cases at the Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces, eight clemency petitions, seven civilian federal court of claims petitions, and three federal habeas petitions.

WHEREFORE, appellate defense counsel respectfully request that this court grant the instant motion.

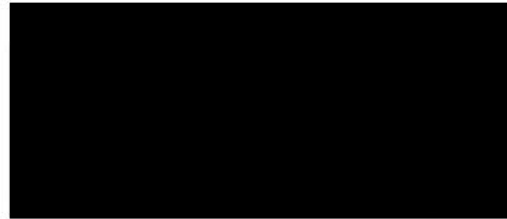
