MEMORANDUM FOR ALL STAFF JUDGE ADVOCATES

SUBJECT: Use of Military Justice On-Line as an Enterprise Application

1. On 8 June 2009, my predecessor directed that Military Justice On-Line (MJO) and the monthly Military Justice Report (MJR) be used as the sole military justice processing, data collection, and reporting systems at United States Army Judge Advocate General's Corps (JAGC) legal offices. This memorandum updates that guidance.
2. Military Justice On-Line is the Army's enterprise military justice application. With the recent addition of the MJO Courts-Martial Module (MJO Phase III), MJO is now a "cradle-to-grave" tool that produces and tracks all key military justice actions, and provides leaders with detailed reports on the status of courts-martial, administrative separations, reprimands, and Article 15s.
3. Use of MJO for all military justice actions is mandatory, effective 1 August 2012.
4. Beginning 1 August 2012, all SJAs will use MJO to personally certify monthly military justice data required by AR 27-10, and discontinue reporting in the MJR application.
5. The JAGC recently released an "off-line" version of MJO for austere forward locations that do not have sufficient bandwidth to use web-based MJO. Although not mandatory, I request all units in forward deployed locations with limited bandwidth to strongly consider using this application. After a period of time, MJO Off-Line will be required for forward deployed forces.
6. I have directed that MJO be integrated into military justice training at every level of the Corps—from Advanced Individual Training to TJAGLCS Graduate Course. Ensure your personnel are trained and proficient on MJO, and that MJO is fully utilized in your military justice practice.
7. Any exceptions to these policies will be forwarded through the Chief, Criminal Law, Office of The Judge Advocate General, for decision by the Assistant Judge Advocate General for Military Law and Operations.
