

ANNOUNCEMENT OF DEATH

Colonel (Retired) Edward W. Haughney. COL Haughney died on 1 January 2012. He was 94 years old.

COL (Ret) Haughney was born in Brooklyn, New York. Following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, he entered the Army and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the Field Artillery in 1942. During World War II, COL Haughney participated in combat operations in Normandy, the liberation of Brest from German occupation, and in the Battle of the Bulge. As a result of his actions during the Battle of the Bulge, he was awarded a Bronze Star. COL Haughney's artillery battalion received a Presidential Unit Citation for its action during the Battle of the Bulge, the only artillery battalion to receive that award by itself and not as part of an Infantry unit.

As World War II ended, COL Haughney redeployed to Fort Bragg. In January 1949, he graduated from St. John's University School of Law in Brooklyn, New York, and entered the Judge Advocate General's Corps in February of the same year. As a Judge Advocate, COL Haughney deployed to the Dominican Republic during Operation Power Pack and to Vietnam where he was the Staff Judge Advocate for General Westmoreland and Military Assistance Command Vietnam. COL Haughney served the JAG Corps in a variety of other assignments; including, Military Prosecutor in Japan during the Korean War; International Law Instructor at The Judge Advocate General's School; Chief, International Affairs Branch, Office of The Judge Advocate General; and Legal Advisor, European Command (EUCOM).

Following his retirement from the Army in 1972, COL Haughney began teaching at the Dickinson School of Law at Penn State where he taught for over 30 years before retiring in 2005.

COL Haughney will be deeply missed by many. He is survived by his wife of 68 years, Regina; three daughters; and one son.
